OVERVIEW

- CAA offers a collegiate environment for lifelong adult education and ongoing experiences within familiar and new areas of study for adults with differing abilities.
- There are no entrance exams or pre-requisites required for new student registration. New students register through the administrative office and schedule a welcome meeting with the Dean of Instruction.
- Students may 1) earn certificates for completion of individual classes, with no requirements
 on the number of classes they must take or length of time they must attend or 2) register for
 an undergraduate, graduate, or post-graduate course of study with no limit on the
 number of times they may repeat these tracks within similar or new areas of emphasis.
- The 60-credit undergraduate course of study is available to students of all learning levels and instructional needs. There are no requirements for the number or type of classes undergraduates must take, attendance per week, or frequency of attendance. Students may repeat the undergraduate course of study as frequently as they like. Full or partial credit is granted based on the amount of experience, exposure, and participation in learning activities possible for each student during a given quarter, as demonstrated through class attendance and as reported by the instructor.
- Launch of a student's additional 120-credit **graduate** course of study occurs through identification of primary areas of learning strength and identification of one of those area as the student's "graduate emphasis." The student can also take other elective classes outside of that area of emphasis. Graduate students begin moving skills outside of the walls of class into broader use through collaborative work between CAA and community partners. There are no requirements for the number of classes graduates must take per week and students may repeat similar or new graduate programs as frequently as they like.
- CAA's post-graduate course of study also requires an additional 240 credits of work and
 encourages increased use of skills within a chosen area of emphasis through global
 applications. There are no requirements for the number of classes post-graduates must take
 per week and students may repeat similar or new post-graduate programs as frequently as
 they like.
- This is a comprehensive catalog of all current and past classes within each School. Each particular class may not be offered each quarter refer to the Current Quarter Schedule on the website for the current quarter list of classes.

Frequently Requested Information Regarding CAA Funding Inquiries At Regional Centers:

When meeting with your case manager to complete a POS form requesting class coverage, you may need the following information:

- ✓ Up to 60 hours/quarter may be covered based on individual qualification
- ✓ Consumers must get preapproval for classes covered through the Regional Center before the start of the quarter
- ✓ CAA is a charitable nonprofit vs. an educational nonprofit; CAA does not compete with .edu programs
- ✓ CAA offers private diplomas that are non-transferrable to state-accredited organizations
- ✓ CAA's s vendor number is ZS0975
- ✓ CAA's budget code is 102, Group, \$27.24 per unit (hour) as of July 1, 2016
- ✓ Class sessions are 1 unit (hour) per week (as of September 26, 2016)
- \checkmark Each individual class meets for 9 weeks per quarter: 1 unit x 9 weeks = 9 units total per class, per quarter \$27.24 x 9 units = \$245.16 total per class, per quarter
- ✓ Students are giving 2 excused absences/class/quarter. Students will be charged \$30/class at the 3rd absence/class/quarter privately reimbursed not through SARC; Zoom/distance learning is an option for students who cannot be physically present.
- ✓ Current and future quarter dates are included on CAA's emailed "Weekly Updates" documents each Monday morning. Current quarter start/end dates are also on the current class schedule, available on our website: www.collegeofadaptivearts.org
- ✓ CAA class credits, applied toward students' diploma or certificate goals, are awarded based on exposure to and experience with class concepts at each individual student's own pace and level of ability with instruction toward increased independent use of skills
- ✓ All students need to be 18 years of age or older, and there is no age limit for participation
- ✓ There is no age or participation cut-off for services. Students may take one class and receive a certificate, take classes from time to time, pursue a CAA diploma in a selected field of study, repeat diploma tracks on an ongoing basis, etc. CAA provides opportunities for lifelong adult education in a collegiate environment emphasizing personal responsibility, self-advocacy, independence, community involvement, and applied cognitive skill-building through learning and class/community events.
- ✓ An example of student objectives connected to their studies, including benchmark ("before") and target ("after") goals, include a current rate or level of occurrence (ex: advocacy or health and wellness-related activities) and sustained or additional outcomes through experience in a particular class or classes.



SCHOOL OF ART

School Departments:

Department of Fine Arts

- Traditional Art Techniques
- Fine Arts Exploratory Lab

This class in fine arts techniques will cover such methods as watercolor, print-making, sketching, and other artistic media. Students will contribute pieces toward our ongoing department portfolio of CAA student artist work. All sections of this class include the same curriculum offered at different times.

3D ART: TEXTILE AND TEXTURAL STUDY

Students in this class will participate in both group and individual exercises making 2-3 three-dimensional art pieces. They will develop and construct their ideas from presented examples of finished works which incorporate paper, papier mache, clay, wire, cardboard, found objects. Finally, participating as a group, they will work at presenting their finished pieces in an exhibition-style showcase.



BEGINNING GLASS FUSING

The Beginning Glass Fusing class teaches the basics of glass design with the aim to produce several art pieces by the end of the quarter. You will learn how to assemble prepared glass, and how glass behaves at different temperatures. Come join me in a class that celebrates color and light.

COLLAGE ART TECHNIQUE

This art form is made from an assemblage of different materials, thus creating a whole new image. Students explore and learn how to combine poetry, paint, pastels, paper and paste to create new art. Visual creativity and written expression are encouraged for fun and freeing experience. Ceramics courses offer students the opportunity to personally connect to artwork through a hands-on, sensory experience as they watch their creative ideas literally take shape. Students also enjoy learning to share their artistic work and visions with others through representation at collaborative art fairs and exhibits. Clay animation projects are shared CAA's television productions and film festivals.

CLAY ANIMATION

A combination of skills such as working with clay, voiceover acting, script writing, and film-making will combine to provide an engaging and creative class for students of all interests and abilities. The final product will be a stop-motion film animated with clay figures and acted through voice-over work of class members. The differently numbered sections of this class include the same class content.

DIGITAL ARTS

This class will teach students about the exciting and creative world of digital arts! Concepts include introductions to programs such as Painter and Photoshop, and use of computers and tablets in their class work. Students will enjoy lots of hands-on experience developing digital art for the CAA archives and to take home as cumulative personal projects.

GRADUATE MASTER STUDY IN VISUAL ARTS*

This is an advanced art class for students interested in bringing their artwork to the next level and already showing an understanding of color mixing. Subjects and materials will be students' choice as they are guided through their pieces. Class goals include creating a portfolio, exploring avenues to publish artwork, and exhibition of art in an upcoming CAA art event. *Prerequisites required, contact instructor for more information or to register.

COMPUTER AND HAND-DRAWN ANIMATION

Are you a fan of animated films and television shows? Have you ever wanted to learn basic skills of hand drawn and computer animation? This entertaining class will teach students animation skills through an introduction to basics of hand-drawn characters and environment sketching, and



experience with basic software applications for developing animated short projects that bring ideas and pictures to life. The only requirement is a love for animation and a desire to bring the fun!

Students and families interested in participating in either of these groups receive information on related meetings and events occurring throughout the quarter, planning activities to unify the student body, increase school spirit, contribute insight for the student and student family perspective, and organize events for social and fundraising purposes.

Course Descriptions – every class may not be offered each quarter – check Current Course Schedule for specific Quarter offerings:

POETRY

Students will explore their personal and group ideas, interests, and imaginations to create various styles of poetic work. Cumulative projects will include collaborative and individual poems using items such as art, music, and photography for inspiration.

READING AND WRITING LAB

The lab will help each student unlock their potential to realize that individuals of all abilities can share their inner voice through expressive reading and creative writing. Students will also be encouraged to use the library to develop expanded literacy skills through individual and group study.

READING PARTNERS

Reading Partners will connect students who read and students who need additional help in reading. Students will receive a CAA library and ID card and learn to navigate CAA's library system. This class will encourage reading and be a safe place for all reading levels. All sections of this class offer the same content at different days/times.

SIGN LANGUAGE

All students are welcome in this class that teaches the basics of sign language. Students with no background of sign language use or those with a history of signing will enjoy continuing their practice and knowledge together. No prerequisites are required for this course.





SPANISH LANGUAGE AND CULTURE

This class will involve Spanish language study, enriched by exploration of many aspects of the culture. Students who have never learned another language, have dabbled in language studies in the past, or who currently speak Spanish will enjoy participatory and creative group learning.

SPEAKING WITH CONFIDENCE

In Speaking with Confidence, students will learn that improving their body language and vocal variety leads to increased self-esteem. Students will also learn how to become active listeners. In turn, active listening allows students give constructive criticism to their peers. This class welcomes all students and helps train our future public speakers. All sections of Speaking with Confidence include the same curriculum offered at different times.

READING AND WRITING WORKSHOP

The class will help each student unlock their potential to realize that individuals of all abilities can share their inner voice through expressive reading and creative writing. Students will also be encouraged to use the library to develop expanded literacy skills through individual and group study.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

The Student Leadership Council meets weekly to plan student events, organize activities of college life, and provide services to other non-profit groups. Students will apply these efforts to learning about local cultures and activities for expansion of their participation in and contributions to their Bay Area community.

GRADUATE WRITING LAB*

Advanced concepts of writing in multiple styles are covered in this course offering students the opportunity to explore their developing interest in creating original written works. Examples include story and character development for fiction and non-fiction, basics of journalism, and styles of poetry. *Prerequisites required, contact instructor for more information or to register.

School Departments:

Department of Classical & Contemporary Dance

- Folk Dance and Tap
- Classical and Contemporary Dance
- Graduate Dance Clinic

Undergraduate courses in this department promote a lifelong love of dance through instruction in techniques of classical and contemporary styles. Students will gain an understanding of ballet, contemporary, jazz and lyrical dance, adding to their repertoire of arts experience and engagement. Dancers also learn to work together as a group on-stage as they rehearse numbers for performance in the community.

Graduate level dance courses expand upon learned ballet, jazz, and choreography skills in a course of study designed to teach graduate students with dance emphasis techniques for teaching dance to children. Selected children attend some classes as teaching subjects, and participating students become comfortable with the concept and process of teaching small children with differing abilities.

Latizmo Production Development and Dance Touring Company

This innovative combination of hip-hop, salsa, and other urban styles instructs undergraduate and graduate students in working together toward development of choreographed group numbers. Students are engaged by contemporary music styles and dynamic, energetic instruction as they rehearse pieces to be performed at community-based events.

Course Descriptions – every class may not be offered each quarter – check Current Course Schedule for specific Quarter offerings:

BELLY DANCING

Students will learn the basic techniques and joys of belly dancing from professionally-trained dancer Sara Misiego. Students will be given the belly dancing attire they can wear each week on top of their regular dance attire. Wheelchair users and dancers of all abilities are welcomed to come and learn unique genre of dance.

COMMUNITY TOURING ENSEMBLE

This class time is reserved for community outreach performances. CAA will now be scheduling the bulk of community performances on Monday mornings. If you are planning to participate in frequent community tours in dance, choir, children's music, or other class performance ensembles, you should be registered in this Monday morning class.

GRADUATE DANCE 2 - BALLET ENSEMBLE

This class will work on a Midsummer Night's Dream inspired dance set to be performed end of the quarter. The Ballet ensemble will dance the roles of the Earthly Beings and Creatures. *Pre-requisites required, contact professor for more details and for enrollment.

GRADUATE LATIZMO DREAM TEAM*

This is the weekly rehearsal for CAA's Latizmo "Dream Team." This performance ensemble will perform in the community independently, without mirroring the instructor onstage. Participants must have experience in community Latizmo performance and the ability to dance a full rehearsal in professional performance mode. Choreography experience is a plus.

CULTURAL DANCE: SUMMER IN RIO 2



Through physical exertion and various modifications, your movements are expressed through sound. Weighted Ripstix drumsticks provided for in-class use. Classwork can be performed standing or sitting and movements are adaptable to meet individual physical needs. All levels welcome.





SCHOOL OF LIBRARY ARTS

The Library and Media Resource Center at the College of Adaptive Arts is a place for information and inspiration. Students can gather to study, collaborate on projects, and socialize. Parents and caregivers can meet to support each other or enjoy a magazine or good book while their students are engaged in the classroom. Professors can find materials to use in the classroom or as part of a homework assignment. The Library's mission is in part to support the students, professors, and parents as the students pursue their education.

LIBRARY 101

Students will learn use of physical and online library materials, including library processes and etiquette, and applications of these library and literacy tools for enriching their academic work and their daily lives.

GRADUATE READING: SUMMER BOOK CLUB*

As a group, students will select the book[s] to read and discuss. Students are expected to keep up with the reading; bring questions and observations about the plot, characters, organization, etc. and be prepared to contribute to the conversation. *Prerequisites required, contact the instructor to register for this course.

POST-GRADUATE RESEARCH AND PUBLISHING PREP*

This course is designed for students who are ready for post-graduate application of specific skill sets learned in CAA's various schools of study. Student will work together in an online classroom once a



week with professional mentors within their selected area of emphasis toward completion of personal projects of various types for self- publishing through the CAA Library. Established off-site student support is required for assistance with technical needs and out-of-class work requirements. *Prerequisites are also required, contact the instructor for more information or to register.

GRADUATE BOOK CLUB: GRADUATE, PREREQUISITES REQUIRED*

As a group, students will select the book[s] to read and discuss. Students are expected to keep up with the reading; bring questions and observations about the plot, characters, organization, etc. and be prepared to contribute to the conversation. SCHOOL OF MUSIC

"Teaching students to find their own rhythm, voice, and styles of emotional expression through music."



School Departments:

Department of Vocal Arts

- Vocal Studies
- Concert Choir

Emphasis on vocal training includes techniques in such areas as breathing, projection, articulation, posture, pitch recognition, note reading, and blending with an ensemble as part of CAA's Concert Choir.

Department of Instrumental Arts

Instrumental Studies and Songwriting

Coursework includes guitar, percussion and other rotating musical instruments, as well as basics of music writing and music recording. Students of all levels are welcome, from beginners to those with previous experience in music study. The only pre-requisite is a love of music!

Course Descriptions – every class may not be offered each quarter – check Current Course Schedule for specific Quarter offerings:

CONCERT CHOIR

This course in music study includes participation as part of CAA's Concert Choir ensemble. Emphasized skills include warm-up techniques, singing as part of an ensemble, vocal range, and group performance with accompaniment. The Concert Choir occasionally performs in the community, dates and venues TBA.



INSTRUMENTAL STUDIES

Students will increase their exposure to instrument use and musical concepts. Applications of these skills include such creative aspects as use of music as a tool for storytelling. Instruments introduced will include percussion and stringed instruments such as adaptive guitar.

CHILDREN'S MUSIC SING-ALONG TOURING TROUPE

Students will take part in learning sing-along children's songs with instruments to take out on tour to schools and other community venues. Class members will help children learn songs with messages of phonemic awareness, mindfulness, anti-bullying, bi-lingual ability, and joy in the style of Raffi and other acoustic musicians.

DIGITAL MUSIC PRODUCTION

Elements of study within this course include learning and application of techniques featuring guitar, percussion and various other instruments, basics of songwriting, and computer-based music recording and sound engineering. Students of all levels, from beginners to those who have previously taken the class, are encouraged to participate. Weekly classwork includes group-based projects and activities. The only prerequisite is a love of music!

INSTRUMENTAL STUDIES: THE MUSIC OF DISNEY

Students will increase their exposure to instrument use and musical concepts through study of the music from favorite Walt Disney films. Applications of these skills include such creative aspects as use of music as a tool for storytelling. If you love Disney, you will love this class!

ADAPTIVE GUITAR

Styles of performance studied include units on improvisation and rehearsal with an emphasis on musical numbers, monologues, comedy, scene work, and audition skills. In addition to development of ongoing theatre pieces for touring performance, students enjoy rehearsing and performing a collaborative tribute musical production each summer.

COMMUNITY TOURING ENSEMBLES REHEARSAL AND OUTREACH

This class time is reserved for community outreach performances. CAA will now be scheduling the bulk of community performances on Monday mornings. If you are planning to participate in frequent community tours in dance, choir, children's music, or other class performance ensembles, you should be registered in this Monday morning class.

GRADUATE MUSICAL THEATRE 1 SONG AND DANCE REHEARSAL: GRADUATE, PREREQUISITES REQUIRED*





This is the song and dance rehearsal class for CAA's annual musical theatre workshop production, a musical theatre variety show to be performed the week of June 10-14, 2019. Students who wish to be added to the formal cast list must commit to registering for rehearsal class each quarter and participation in the production until completion of the performance in June. This rehearsal class will teach singing skills, dance and choreography skills for the show's big musical numbers. Note: students who cannot attend this rehearsal can register for the Friday morning Musical Theatre Actors' Rehearsal class, which focuses on development of the show's acting roles and scene work. Prerequisites required for students new to this course. Students who participated in last year's "Guys and Dolls" musical theatre performance are automatically eligible to enroll. Contact instructor for more information or to register.

GRADUATE MUSICAL THEATRE 2 ACTOR'S REHEARSAL: GRADUATE, PREREQUISITES REQUIRED*

This is the actors' rehearsal class for CAA's annual musical theatre workshop production, a musical theatre variety show to be performed the week of June 10-14, 2019. Students who wish to be added to the formal cast list must commit to registering for rehearsal class each quarter and participation in the production until completion of the performance in June. This rehearsal will guide students in staging scenes, running lines, and setting movement for the show's group numbers. Note: students who cannot attend this Friday morning rehearsal can register for the Tuesday evening Musical Theatre Song and Dance Rehearsal, which focuses on development of the show's song and dance numbers. Pre-requisites required for students new to this course. Students who participated in last year's "Guys and Dolls" musical theatre performance are automatically eligible to enroll. Contact instructor for more information or to register.

GRADUATE MUSICAL THEATRE: DANCE REHEARSAL*

A second rehearsal class focused on group numbers and scene blocking is available on Friday morning. Students who wish to be added to the formal cast list must commit to registering for one of the rehearsal classes until completion of the performance in June.

Students will stage dance numbers and create choreography for the show. CAA Dean and Production Stage Director Pamela Lindsay will also visit class to teach musical theatre performance concepts. *Pre-requisites required, contact professor for more details and for enrollment.

GRADUATE MUSICAL THEATRE: STAGING

This is the second weekly rehearsal for CAA's annual musical theatre production, The other rehearsal class is held on Thursday evenings. Students who wish to be added to the formal cast list must commit to registering for one or both of the rehearsal classes until the performance in June.

This rehearsal class will guide students in staging the acting, group scenes, and "big chorus numbers" for the show. Students will also contribute to design of the set and technical elements of





the production.

THEATRE PERFORMANCE

Styles of performance studied will include units on improvisation and rehearsal skills with an emphasis on monologues, storytelling, and scene work. Students will perform rehearsed work during class at the end of the quarter.

SPEECH AND ARTICULATION THROUGH JOKE-TELLING

This class includes basic voice and diction work for increased ability through use of such articulators as "lips, teeth, and tip of the tongue." Students will work toward their own, individual goals as they study the importance of breathing and posture for better vocal strength and projection. All work will be done in a group learning environment featuring stand-up comedy, fun, and laughter!

GRADUATE THEATRE TROUPE*

Advanced study of stage performance includes pumping up previous work in monologues, storytelling, and scene work to the next level! Students will also explore period theatre and use of the body, voice, and costumes when approaching classical works such as Shakespeare. MUSIC VIDEO PERFORMANCE AND PRODUCTION

This exciting class involves on-camera and behind-camera study. Dancers will enjoy performing Latizmo hip-hop choreography on camera. Students with technical interest will enjoy filming the video and contributing related photographic work. All levels of ability and experience are welcome!

ON-CAMERA PERFORMANCE

On-camera acting skills for film-making and television work are covered in this course, developing student knowledge of these areas and varied production styles. Focus will include practice with monologues and scene work for film auditioning. All sections of On-Camera Performance include the same curriculum offered at different times.

INTRODUCTION TO PODCASTING
